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Speechcraft Q&A

Take Advantage of This Top Membership Building Tool

Toastmasters International says the Speech-craft program is your club's #1 membership building tool. Yet during my session on Speechcraft at the District 56 Fall Conference, I was surprised to discover how little Toastmasters know about Speechcraft.

Whether your club is struggling to grow or ready to start a new club, consider conducting a Speechcraft program. According to Toastmasters International, "Clubs that conduct a Speechcraft program at least once a year have few membership problems."

What is "Speechcraft"?

Speechcraft is a program designed to teach public speaking skills to non-members. Participants present three to six speeches (depending on the number of sessions), respond to table topics, introduce other speakers and serve as evaluators.

Experienced members of your club plan, promote and coordinate the program, give educational speeches, and serve as advisors to the Speechcraft participants. Speechcraft brings prospective new members into your club to discover the benefits of Toastmasters. If the program is conducted properly, all participants should experience tremendous personal growth.

How does Speechcraft differ from the normal Toastmasters program?

Speechcraft is a seminar-style program offered in four, six or eight sessions. When participants sign up for Speechcraft, they do not become members of Toastmasters. Membership is, of course, offered to graduates of the program.

How does Speechcraft benefit the participants?

Speechcraft introduces public speaking skills in a nonthreatening and supportive environment. Participants learn skills they can immediately apply at work and at home. The Toastmasters Speechcraft brochure states that Speechcraft will "improve performance in meeting the public, conducting business meetings, motivating people, interviewing for jobs, selling ideas or products, and solving problems."

How does Speechcraft benefit the club and its members?

In addition to attracting new members, promoting Speechcraft can raise awareness of your club in your community or company.

The program also gives members opportunities to use their communication and leadership skills. A Speechcraft coordinator can receive credit toward the ATM-Gold requirements. Educational speeches given by club members can help them fulfill their ATM-Silver requirements (using the Better Speaker series). Also, members experience personal growth by serving as advisors to the participants. As I once learned from a wise mentor, "the best way to gain knowledge is to keep giving it away."

How do you conduct the program?

Speechcraft can be conducted as part of your regular Toastmasters program or as a seminar outside the normal club environment. If you conduct Speechcraft within your regular meetings, you'll have to allow enough time for Speechcraft participants to get the full benefit of the program.

How many participants are in a Speechcraft program?

A single Speechcraft program has one coordinator and five or more participants. TI suggests that a Speechcraft conducted within the club should have five to ten participants. More participants can be accommodated outside the club. If enrollment is high, consider conducting concurrent Speechcraft programs.

What about fees?

Yes, you can charge a fee to anyone registering for Speechcraft. The program should at least pay for itself. In addition to the cost of materials ordered from TI, you need to factor in the cost of other supplies, advertising, refreshments and room rental. A Speechcraft program can also be used as a fundraising activity for your club.

However, please note that TI specifies that "no individual, educational institution or other organization may derive financial gain either directly or indirectly from conducting the Speechcraft program."

How do we get started?

Order the "Speechcraft Coordinator's Guide" (catalog no. 204 – \$3.00) from TI. This inexpensive guide tells you everything you need to begin planning and promoting Speechcraft. Any district officer should be able to help you get started.

You can also order a "Speechcraft Starter Kit" (catalog no. 205-\$20.00) from TI. This kit includes 3 coordinator guides, 5 participant handbooks, advisor instructions, a receipt book, certificates and promotional material.

To re-energize your club with the excitement of a common project, start planning a Speechcraft program soon. You'll be able to convert Speechcraft participants to new members as soon as they experience the positive benefits of the program.

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Gavel Clubs Add Communication Skills to Prison Ministry

For more than four years I have been mentoring Gavel Clubs in prisons. Last year, 150 free world people visited the Central prison unit in Sugar Land with me. That night, the two prison-based Gavel Clubs put on a church service for us. Three men gave 20-minute ser-

mons, four men gave personal testimonies, and the Spanish and English choirs sang.

On the way out, one of the visitors, a psychologist for Katy Independent School District, said, "Our pastor could pick up some pointers on delivering a sermon." She also said that the four men, in their testimonies, ministered to her. "I was able to resolve personal issues in my own life that I had never been able to resolve, no matter what books I read." How many of you would expect an inmate to turn your life around?

In addition to developing communication and leadership skills and building a positive community, the Gavel Club members make very intelligent, cogent statements that other inmates and the rest of the world need to hear. Soon that will be possible. Last year, after meeting with Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials, I received permission to video the inmates giving their talks. A website featuring these videos is in the works. I'll notify Toastmasters when the site is up, so you can see what the Gavel Clubs are accomplishing in Texas prisons.

The one thing missing for these clubs is the Toastmasters magazine. Gavel Clubs don't receive subscriptions. If you belong to more than one club, you can contribute to the Gavel Clubbers' training by donating copies of *The Toastmaster*. Just take off the mailing labels and send your magazines to:

Table Topics – Are You Ready?

You have three chances to prepare for Table Topics sessions. Here's how to use your participation in Table Topics to become a more effective speaker.

Before the meeting

- 1. **Read** Read magazines, novels, newspapers, blogs, journals read anything. Read as much as you can.
- 2. **Form Your Own Opinions** Do you have a favorite color, a favorite season, a favorite holiday? How do you feel about current events, the war in Iraq, who won the World Series, your state senators or representatives? What do think when you hear the words "love," "honor," "lies" or "murder"? Decide how you feel about each of these topics with at least two reasons why you feel the way you do.
- 3. **Talk** Talk about your opinions and feelings to your friends, family and co-workers. These conversations are practice Table Topic sessions. When someone asks you what the President should do now that he has been re-elected, you'll have an answer if you have read, listened and formed an opinion.

At the meeting, in your seat

- 1. **Think** Listen to the question. Use the 10 seconds in your seat to retrieve information on the topic stored in your mind.
- 2. **Organize** Aim at having two points. Which point will you give first? Do you have supporting reasons for this point?
- 3. **Plan Your Opening** Do you remember a quote? Do you have a question? You can always repeat the Table Topic question you were asked.

At the meeting, on your feet

- 1. **One Last Review** Use the few seconds while you're walking to the front or while you're standing up and saying "Mr. Table Topic Master, fellow Toastmasters and guests..." to review your organization. How will you open? What are your two points? Start formulating your closing.
- 2. **Deliver** Give your opening. State your two points with support. Avoid rambling. Close and sit down.

Next time you will be even better.

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How to Become a Competent Leader Get Full Credit for Your Club Officer Position

Competent Leader (CL) is probably the least understood and easiest-to-achieve Toastmasters educational level. Anyone who is or has been a club officer can quickly achieve the Competent Leader award.

Most Toastmasters are familiar with the CTM (Competent Toastmaster) award. Complete the ten speeches in the Basic Communication and Leadership manual and you attain your CTM. Worldwide, most Toastmasters achieve their CTM within 18 months of joining Toastmasters. The Competent Toastmaster (CTM) award recognizes achievement towards fundamental communication skills.

What does it take to become a Competent Leader?

The Competent Leader (CL) award recognizes achievement towards fundamental leadership skills. If you're already a CTM, it takes exactly three things to become a CL:

- Successfully complete a term as a club officer (6 or 12 months, depending on your club). During that term, you must attend executive committee meetings and work toward your club's success plan. Any club officer position can be used to attain a CL:
 - President
 - VP Education
 - VP Membership
 - VP Public Relations
 - Treasurer
 - Secretary
 - Sergeant-at-Arms
- Attend the district-sponsored club officer training (TLI—Toastmasters Leadership Institute) for that office. (See page 2 for information about the TLI sessions coming soon.)
- 3. Conduct any two scripted training programs from the Successful Club Series or the Leadership Excellence Series. (See list of topics in box at right.) These speeches are available for purchase on the TI WHQ web site. (Your club may already own copies; many clubs do.) These presentations contain information you and your club really need to know. As a presenter, you learn the material and then present

it to your club. What a great win-win situation.

That's it! If you have time to be a club officer, you have time to become a Competent Leader. There's no doubt that being a club officer is hard work. But once you commit to being an officer, achieving the Competent Leader award is easy. This is the way you receive full credit for all that hard work. Many people work on their CTM and their CL simultaneously during their first year in Toastmasters.

What happens when you file for your Competent Leader award?

- 1. You'll receive a certificate in the mail and you'll be recognized by your club for achieving a Toastmasters milestone. You'll be able to add the letters "CL" behind your name.
- If you wish, a letter recognizing your achievement will be sent to your employer. Your human resources (HR) department will normally file this letter in your permanent employee folder. You're "on record" as having been trained as a leader by a wellrecognized, worldwide educational organization.
- Your club gets credit for a Competent Leader educational completion. That's worth a full point on your club's DCP (Distinguished Club Program). Each club needs at least 5 points, and a CL is one of the quickest and easiest ways to earn a point.

But remember, none of these three wonderful things happen just because you complete your officer term. You have to work on your club's success plan, attend district-sponsored officer training and give the two additional presentations.

Let's do a little math.

Each club can use two CLs to earn those two leadership points on the DCP. With about 130 clubs in District 56, we should have at least 260 CLs awarded each year. Last year we only had 109 CL awards. That means more than 75 District 56 Toastmasters clubs did not receive all possible DCP leadership points for their club's officer positions.

What about your club? There is no easier way to add one or two points to your DCP total.

Let's look at it another way.

Each of the 130 clubs in District 56 has seven officers; some clubs have two sets of officers each year. That's about 1,000 potential Competent Leaders each year. Last year clubs in our district only received 109 Competent Leader awards. That means up to 900 Toastmasters did not receive full credit for their officer positions.
