Toastmasters provides members with lifelong learning opportunities. Member success leads to club success. Club success leads to area, division and district success.

District 56 is currently ranked #4 in the world – a GOLDEN achievement. You are achieving your goals, and in turn, the district is achieving its goals.

- Congratulations to every member who has achieved an educational goal this year! As of January 31, 2005, 129 members have achieved CTM and 58 have achieved ATM.
- Congratulations for adding new members to your clubs! District 56 has added 602 new members and 205 new charter members since July 1, 2004.
- Nine new clubs have been chartered since July 1, 2004.
- Out of 135 paid clubs, 21 clubs have already achieved five or more Distinguished Club goals, and 69 clubs have 20 or more members.

TI President Jon Greiner's theme for the year is "Changing

Lives One at a Time." What will your club do to recruit more members, to change more lives through Toastmasters this year?

Every year, TI promotes three membership-building campaigns. During the "Talk Up Toastmasters" membership building campaign in February and March, each club that adds five new members receives a ribbon for their club banner. Each member who recruits five to ten new members during the Toastmasters year receives a pin. Recruiting 15 new members earns a member a necktie or scarf. How many members has your club added this year? How many new members have you personally recruited? How many lives will your club change this year? Share the wealth of Toastmasters by inviting guests and recruiting new members for your club.

Your district team wants to end the year with at least 150 clubs and 3,300 members. If you have benefited from your membership in our organization, share the GOLD of Toastmasters with others, so more lives can be changed.

It is always a privilege to travel to District 56. My February visit was my last as International Director. It certainly won't be my last time to come home. Home is where the heart is, and my heart will always consider District 56 as home. There's no place like home!

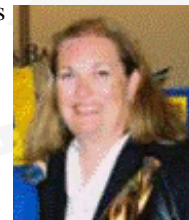

Contest Season Is Now Enjoy These Fun, Learning Opportunities

Contest season has begun. There's no better way to enjoy the spirit of competition and fine-tune your speaking skills in a supportive environment at the same time.

The spring contests will focus on international speech and evaluation. Clubs should conduct these contests as they will be conducted at the area, division, and district levels. The district winner of the International Speech Contest will represent D56 at the Region III contest and vie for the opportunity to compete in the 2005 World Championship of Public Speaking.

Be sure to familiarize yourself with the TI contest rules to help ensure an efficient contest and avoid contestant disqualification. Remember that the evaluation contest requires a test speaker. Test speakers can do a speech

for manual credit.

Use trained judges to officiate at your contests. Several D56 Toastmasters are familiar with contest rules and trained to judge contestants. Try to use judges who have completed the D56 judges' training.

What if you don't want to compete or you don't meet eligibility requirements? You can serve as a contest official, for example, as sergeant at arms, ballot counter, or timer. Coordinating a TM contest involves a lot of work. You might help with publicity, registration, refreshments, programs, awards, or photography.

If nothing else, invite contestants to speak at your club meeting so they can practice their speeches and receive constructive feedback. Audience members are needed at the contests. Come out and support your fellow Toastmasters. Contests are win-win events for everyone — the contestants, officials, contest committee members, and audience.
